FRIDAY SESSION

In session with the Little Flock Church, Jackson, Jackson Co., Ohio, August 6, 7, 8, 1965. Delegates and messengers from our sister Associations, and a wonderful congregation of members and friends, began to assemble themselves at the stand that had been prepared by the faithful brethren and friends of the Little Flock Church for preaching which was to begin about 9 A. M.

At the direction of God's omnipotent hand, nature had provided a beautiful place on the summit of a hill among a forest of oak trees etc.; overlooking the fields of the valley below that were striving to look green and to be gay. This scene brought to the faithful eye more vividly the tranquil beauties of Gethsemane's garden of compassion as was seen from the hill tops of the hills surrounding Judea almost 2000 years ago.

As the melodies of those old time spiritual songs begin to swell the breezes, and drift down over the mountain side, the Glory of God was opened up and the firmaments of heaven was declared. Shouts of glory and praises of God burst forth from the tongues of God's faithful pilgrims inviting Elder Hiram Adkins to the pulpit. After a few well directed remarks, using the words of the prophet, "I shall not go beyond the word of God," prayer was offered by the same. Elder Homer Elliott then came to the stand to deliver the introductory sermon. He reached into God's treasure chest of boundless riches and chose the following scripture for a subject: Isaiah Chapter 62, verse 1. "For Zions sake will I not hold my peace, and for Jerusalem's will I not rest," etc. Brother Elliott was obedient to the spirit and was blessed to bring a message that strengthened the hopes and revived

Following the introductory the delegates and messengers were invited to assemble themselves at the meeting house for the purpose of transacting any and all business that may legally and properly come before the body. His remarks were timely and seasoned with divine grace that brings deliverance to everyone who believes in the saving of the soul. After prayer, our beloved moderator came forward and announced that the Eighth Session of the Northern New Salem Association was ready to do work. The Association proceeded to work in the following manner.

- 1. Letters from the several churches called for and correctly noted. By move and second, the letter from the Little Flock Church was read, and by motion all the letters were received and the delegates from the respective churches were seated in order. Requests and querries were referred to the committee on arrangements.
- 2. The Association was organized by electing Elder Baxter Osbourne Moderator; Elder Sidney Hudson Asst. Moderator; Elder Roy B. Akers Clerk and Elder Claude Ousley Asst. Clerk.
- 3. Called for newly organized churches desiring to join our union and none responded.
- 4. By move and second the reading of the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum, and the Constitution were omitted.
- 5. Called for letters from corresponding Associations and received the following:
- (a) NEW SALEM. Represented by the following messengers: Milford Adams, Whipple Reynolds, J. B. Hamilton, Banner Manns, Harry Moore, Walker Sturgill, Riley Hall, Freel Tackett, Hawley Warrens, Mitchall Chaffins, Woodroe Dye, Jinks Ray, and Ivory Sowards. By move and second their letter and file of minutes were received and the messengers were invited to seat with us in an

advisory council by the right hand of fellowship by our beloved Moderator.

(b) UNION. Represented by the following messengers: J. L. Williamson, John M. Mullins, Covis Tackett, Sol Tackett, Gene Johnson, Sam Irwin, J. Mitchell, Lester Isaacs, A. P. Morrison, and Garland Mullins. By move and second their letter and file of minutes were received and their messengers were invited to a seat with us in an advisory council by the right hand of fellowship by our beloved Moderator.

(c) SARDIS. Represented by the following messengers: Ken Varney, Edwin May, Mack Smith, Earl D. West, Chester Dials, Mack Young, Troy Walters, and Newt Walters. By move and second their letter and file of minutes were received and the messengers were invited to seat with us in an advisary council by the right hand of fellowship by our beloved Moderator.

(d) PHILADELPHIA. Represented by the following messengers: Elias Cotten, John Moore, Dave Gilliam, Golden Adkins, Don Marritt, Ellis Toliver, and Fred Akers. By move and second their letter and file of minutes were received, and the messengers were invited to seat with us in advisory council by the right hand of fellowship by our beloved Moderator.

(e) MUD RIVER. Represented by the following messengers: Luther Ball, Jr., and Edgar Miller. Their letter and file of minutes were received and the messengers were invited to seat with us in advisory council by the right hand of fellowship by our beloved Mcderator.

- (f) INDIAN BOTTOM. Represented by the following messengers: Beckham Fields, Olas Baldridge, Alonzo Allen, and Billy Day. By move and second their letter and file of minutes were received, and the messengers were invited to seat with us in an advisory council.
- 6. Called for Association of our same faith and order desiring to take correspondence with us, and received none.
- 7. Called for transient members and ministers and received the following: Elbie Collins, C. Wicker. Johnny Bentley, John Elliott, Lonnie Mounts, Ernest Ward, Jimmy Rowe, and Jesse Bryant.

8. Resolved that the Moderator make all temporary appointments.

9. Appointed a committee on ministry consisting of one delegate from each church together with the entire delegation from the Little Flock Church to arrange preaching for Friday night and Saturday, who reported as follows: Friday night—Elder Whipple Reynolds, Elder John Moore, Elder Edwin May, and Elder Woodrow Dye. For Saturday—Elder Alonzo Allen, Elder Elias Cotten, Elder Milford Adams, and Elder Banner Manns.

10. By move and second the Northern New Salem Association agreed to correspond with the following Associations, and that Elder Roy B. Akers write the corresponding letters to: New Salem, Union, Sardis, Philadelphia, Mud River, and Indian Bottom. The letter from the Thornton Union was referred to the committee on arrangements.

UNION. To be held with the Hurricane Gap Church, Wise, Wise Co., Virginia, beginning on Friday before the third Saturday in September, 1965, and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend—Elders: Paris Tackett, Johnnie Bentley, Roy Hamilton, Sid Hudson, Marion Parnell, Baxter Osborne, R. B. Akers, and H. N. Vanderpool. Brothers: Shade Meeks, Walter Mullins, and Roman, Mullins. Roman Mullins.

PHILADELPHIA. To be held with the Little Mary Church, Ashland, Boyd Co., Ky., beginning on Friday before the second Saturday in August, 1965, and continuing the two following days. Elders Baxter Osborne, Claude Ousley, Paris Tackett, Delmar Williams, Steve Osborne, Anthony Hamilton, Roy Hamilton, and Sid Hudson. Brothers: Roman Mullins, Arvid Blevins, Shade Meeks, Jesse Bryant, Carlos Little and Alonzo Tackitt to attend

SARDIS. To be held with the Southern Home Church, Ocala, Florida, beginning on Friday before the second Saturday in September, 1965, and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend-Elders: R. B. Akers, Johnnie Bentley, Roy Hamilton, and H. N. Vanderpool.

INDIAN BOTTOM. To be held with the Cedar Grove Church, Hallie, Letcher Co., Ky., beginning on Friday before the first Saturday in September, 1965, and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend—Elders: Roy Caudill, Baxter Osborne, and R. B. Akers. Brothers: Hindrix Hampton, Hillard Proffitt, and Arvid Blevins.

MUD-RIVER. To be held with the Little Laurel Church, Myra, Lincoln Co., W. Va., beginning on Friday before the fourth Saturday in August, 1965, and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend—Elders: Baxter Osborne, Steve Osborne, and R. B. Akers. Brothers: Walter Mullins, Jesse Bryant and Carlos Little.

11. Appointed a committee on arrangements consisting of one delegate from each church, the Moderator, and clerk of the Association, and the transient members to draw up a bill of arrangements to work from on Saturday.

12. By move and second the Association agreed to adjourn until 9 A. M. Saturday.

SATURDAY MORNING, AUGUST 7, 1965

Met pursuent to adjournment and after singing a few of the old songs of Zion's happy land, services were opened by Elder Woodroe Dye who made some well directed remarks in the channel of spiritual advice and Godly council. Prayer was made by Elder H. N. Vanderpool. His prayer renewed the faith, increased the hope, and strengthened the tie that binds the children of God together, enabling the Association to work with a spirit of love and in harmony with the will of God. After prayer and supplication and the giving of thanks, the Association proceeded to do business as follows.

- 1. Called the roll and noted the absentees.
- 2. Read the bill of arrangements and discharged the committee.
- 3. The circular letter written by Elder Steve Osborne was read. By move and second it was ordered printed in our minutes. By the same move Elder Paris Tackett was chosen to write a circular letter for the approval at the 9th Session of our Association in 1966.

- 4. Appointed a committee on finance as follows: Delmar Williams, John M. Mullins, and Paris Tackett who reported the sum of \$530.00 contributed by the churches, \$40.00 for pictures, and \$72.00 contributed by the bretheen, making a total of \$642.00.
- Called on treasurer to file his report, who reported as follows:

- 6. By move and second the treasurer's report was received, and he was authorized to have (4000) copies of these minutes printed and is to receive \$50.00 for his services. The printer's fee is to appear on the cover of these minutes.
- 7. By move and second obituaries of deceased members of our churches are to be printed in these minutes. Pictures can be had at the expense of the member desiring them. By the same move obituaries of deceased members of our sister Associations be printed also.
- 8. Called on brethren who agreed to attend union meetings, and corresponding Associations to make their report. The faithful were commended and the failures excused.
- 9. Appointed the same committee as acted yesterday to arrange preaching for Saturday night and on the Sabbath, who reported as follows—Saturday night: Elder Hawley Warrens, Elder James Rowe, Elder Ivory Sowards. For the Sabbath: Elder H. N. Vanderpool, Elder Garland Mullins, Elder Mitchall Chaffins and Elder

Baxter Osborne, our beloved Moderator, to preach and close.

10. By move and second the request from the Indianapolis Church desiring to change the name of their church to Little Oval was granted.

11. By move and second the request from the Little Zion Church desiring to change their union meeting time and communion time was granted.

12. By move and second the request from the Little Ruth Church desiring to change their meeting time was granted.

13. By move and second the request from the Pleasant View Church desiring to change their meeting time was granted.

14. Regarding the question relative to the Thornton Union Association—By move and second the Northern New Salem Association agreed to withhold their letter to the Thornton Union for 1965 for reasons herein described.

(REASONS: For failure to labor properly with their sisters who continue to cut their hair after becoming members of the church. AND, for allowing their ministers to preach with ministers not of our Faith and Order. The above practices are in direct violation of the established order and principals of Old Regular Baptist faith and order.)

15. By move and second the Association agreed to pay the expenses of one car bearing messengers to the Sardis Association being held in Ocala, Florida.

16. In answer to a request from Maggie Home Church it was moved and seconded that the following advice appear in our minutes. RESOLVED: that each church in our union shall hold it's own KEY. And it is to be the sole judge of its members as long as it does not violate the word of God, the order of the Association, or Old Regular Baptist principals.

17. By move and second the request of the Little Zion Church asking for the Association for 1966 was granted. By a vote Elder Roy Caudill was chosen to preach the

introductory sermon, Elder Baxter Osborne is to be his alternate.

18. By move and second the Association agreed to publish directions on how to reach the church serving as host to the Association.

Directions on how to get to the Little Zion Church located at 63181 Romeo Plank Rd., Macomb Co., Michigan. Follow U.S. 23 to 199 at Fosteria, Ohio. Take 199 to Interstate 75 Expressway. Take 75 to Interstate 94 east. Take Interstate 94 east to M. 53 north. Take M. 53 north to 29 Mile Rd. Turn right on 29 Mile Rd. to the first STOP sign, approximately 3 miles on the corner to the left.

19. By move and second the clerk read the minutes of the Association for the approval of the delegates. By the same move the minutes were approved as read.

20. By move and second the Association agreed to adjourn to the time and place mentioned above, for the Ninth Annual Session of the Northern New Salem Association. The Association was closed by remarks and prayer by Elder Delmar Williams.

SABBATH MORNING, AUGUST 7, 1965

As the shadows of Saturday's night moved on into eternity making room for the dawning of another Sabbath, rain clouds began to form in the north western part of the country. As the clouds moved into the vicinity where the Association was being held, a light misty rain began to fall. The fear of rain did not prevent the people from finding their way to the summit of the hill where services were to take place. By 9:30 A.M. the beautiful rays of sunlight had driven most of the rain clouds away. Surely someone had been praying for God to give us a beautiful day for the witness was herein made manifest.

Soon the house was overflowing with weary pilgrims Soon the house was overflowing with weary pilgrims that had traveled far and near together with many who were anxious to hear what the man of God had to say concerning "life and salvation." As our beloved Moderator noted in his closing remarks, Quote: "While it is that ministers of other faiths are no doubt meeting this day in various places and countries discussing worldly problems, yokeing themselves up equally with rioters, trouble makers and the unfruitful workers of iniquity, while we, the ministers of God, have not bothered to scarcely mention the conditions that man has caused to be thrust mention the conditions that man has caused to be thrust upon the world of mankind today because of disobedience and unbelief." End of quote.

Elder H. N. Vanderpool humbly approached the stand in much meekness to deliver the opening prayer. His few remarks were seasoned with love and grace that brought shouts of joy from those who's cup was being filled with mana from a land from afar. Elder Mitchall Chaffins came to the stand as the third witness. He quoted the 31st verse of the 11th Chapter of Luke as a subject to preach from. "The Queen of the south shall rise up in the judgement with the men of this generation, and condemn them: for she come from the utmost parts of the earth to hear the wisdom of Solomon; and behold, a greater than Solomon is here." The theme of his sermon embraced the last stanza of the verse above. He was filled with much compassion for sinners and longed to see them come flocking to the everlasting fountain of life. everlasting fountain of life.

Elder Baxter Osborne was the fourth witness of the day. Scarcely had he approached the stand before it was made manifest that God's divine spirit was both in and

upon him. As the brethren began to sing: "Farewell My Dear Brethren," the daughters of Zion began shouting and that sweet witness that flows from breast to breast gave spiritual proof that God's spirit was directing the closing of the Eighth Session of the Northern New Salem Association according to His own good will and pleasure. Rarely has the writer seen our beloved Moderator so overcome with love and compassion as he was on this day. May everything that was done or said be to the honor and glory of God, our RIGHTEOUS Father.

Resolved that the officers and delegates of this Association always remember the brethren of the Little Flock Church for their hospitality and the kind manner in which they cared for the Association and all visitors and much needed friends. We want to extend to them

our humble thanks and brotherly love.

We also beg to humbly thank the many faithful sisters and friends for their untiring efforts in the preparation of the good food that so bountifully filled the tables both on the church grounds and in their homes. Surely God will richly bless them for the many sacrifices that they made in order to see that everyone had plenty to eat and a good bed to sleep on.

May the God of all grace, peace and mercy keep His little children under His unending watchcare, and that the same love that existed at the close of the Association abound in the hearts of everyone until we meet again, is the humble prayer of the officers and delegates of

this beloved Association.

Dear Brethren of the Northern New Salem Association:

As I was chosen by you last year to write this circular letter, I hope to be guided by the spirit of the almighty God, as I realize I am a weak creature. I hope to give instructions that would be to your benefit that we could work for the better and not for the worse. I will at this time call to your attention the twelfth chapter and the first verse of Daniel—"And at that time shall Michael stand up the great prince which standeth for the children of thy people. And there shall be a time of trouble such as never was since there was a nation even to that same time. And at that time thy people shall be delivered, everyone that shall be found written in the Book. good. So brethren be good to one another and love and pray for one another. So may the God of all divine grace who has power both in heaven and in earth, be with you all, is the prayer of your unworthy brother in hope of eternal life.

CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTHERN NEW SALEM ASSOCIATION WHEN ORGANIZED IN 1958

From a long series of experiences, we the OLD REG-ULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government:

1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association, and upon their producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

2. In the letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any church in the union.

4. The Association, when convened, shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

5. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk chosen by the members present.

6. New churches may be admitted into the Union, who shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received, and every church in the Union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

- 7. Every query presented by the church to the Association, being first debated in their own churches, shall be taken up by the Association.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association except when withdrawn by the one who made it.
- 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the church with Minutes of Association.
- 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums as they think proper, and send it by their delegates to the Association, and such sums to be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association, who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.
- 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by the Secretary appointed by the Association, who shall receive a compensation for his services.
- 12. The Minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises unless the same is dispensed with.
- 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by the majority of the Union, if deemed necessary.
- 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations which shall be by a unanimous vote.
- 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the churches; to give churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association, to appropriate the money contributed by the churches for the Association fund, to any purpose they may think

proper; to appoint any member, by their consent to transact any business which they see necessary, and they shall have the power to withdraw from any church in the Union, which shall violate the rules of the Association, or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; to admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory. Isiah, 45:5. 1st Cor. 8:6. 1st John, 5:7.
- 2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the written words of God, and the only rules of Faith and practices, 2nd Peter 1:21, 1st Timothy 3:16, 2nd Timothy 3:16.
- 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace. For by grace are ye saved through Faith. Isa. 42:1, Eph. 2:8.
- 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore a Saviour is needed for our redemption. Gen. 2:7, Romans 5:12.
- 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance, and believe in the gospel, and regeneration of the soul. and sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none such shall fall away and be lost. Prov. 8:4, Matt. 9:13, Mark. 2:17, 2nd Timothy 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23.
- 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of JESUS CHRIST. 2nd Timothy 1:9, Luke 18: 13-14, Acts 13:39.
- 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on earth, and the mode is, IMMERSION back foremost so as to cover all over. Matt. 3:14, Luke 1:9-10, John 1:31-32-33, Romans 6:4, Eph. 4:5.
- 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Saviour, and that by the use of bread and fruit of

the vine and feet-washing should be kept up until His second coming, by His believers. Luke 22: 10-11-12, John 13: 7-8-12-13-14-15-16-17, 1st Timothy 5:9-10.

- 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust, and that the joys of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal. John 5:28-29, 1st Cor. 15:51-52, Luke 24:46.
- 10. We believe that no minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel except such as are regularly ordained and baptized, and that by immersion, by a legal administrator of the gospel, and has come under the hands of a regular presbytery of the church. Acts 13:2-3, Romans 1:6, Titus 1:6.
- 11. We believe it is the duty of all church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities. Acts 11:29, Romans 15:26, 1st Cor. 16:1-2.
- 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage, or indulge people in their sins, or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving Faith in CHRIST for salvation, is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us. Matt. 16:12, Acts 8:16 through 21, Romans 16:17-18, Eph. 4:14-15, Gal. 18:9-10.
- 13. We believe that the Church of CHRIST is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ, who have obtained fellowship with the Lord, and with one another, and have given themselves to the Lord, and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the gospel John 11:8-9-10-11, Acts 2:42, 1st John 1:3.
- 14. We believe that JESUS CHRIST is the head of the church, and the government thereof is upon His shoulders. Isaiah 9:6-7, 22:21-22, Luke 1:33.
- 15. None of the above articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation, so as to make God partial directly, or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice, and free consent. John 3:16, Heb. 2:9.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- 2. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk chosen by the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.
- 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.
- No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association.
- 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.
- 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term or appellation than that of "Brother."
- 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of the decorum.
- 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
- 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled. And he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.

Let us never depart from what sayeth the word of God.

(1) Let younger brethren always be reminded that they are to be courteous, and to treat elder brethren as fathers.

(2) All churches and moderators should bear in mind that when a church is newly organized and has elected its officers, they become an independent working body.

(3) Be ye also reminded that all preaching brethren should be courteous and kind one to another, and to never, no never, be guilty of telling visiting brethren that you don't need their help. It's an open violation against you to do so.

(4) Let all our churches be reminded that they are not to lord anything over a sister church in regards to the way they take communion. If you do not feel right in taking the communion the way sister churches practice it, please excuse yourself quietly, and don't talk, or make remarks as to their failures, or the way they have been taught. Remember, it is still Gods house and you may be held responsible to God for the remarks that you make concerning them or about them.

Dear brethren, if you meet with brethren who handle loose talk, or tell tales on other brethren, don't join in with them, lest you become as guilty as they. But rather shame them, and kindly ask them not to talk and make remarks about the imperfections of their brethren. If a brother has aught against another let him do as the bible says: "Go to them, and them alone." If you regard my advice as unselfish, and coming from the heart, you will obey it. I feel that if you will practice these simple rules it will help to bring about a great and unbounding peace to our association.
