PROCEEDINGS

Of The Thirty-Second Annual Session of the Northern New Salem Association of Old Regular Baptist The Church of Jesus Christ

August 4, 5, 6, 1989

Friday Session, August 4, 1989

Arriving from distances far and near were pilgrims, both young and old, to attend the 32nd Annual Session of this blessed old association. Seeing each other, receiving a warm handshake, friendly smiles and words of kindness. Soon caused one to forget the many miles one had traveled to be among God's people.

As they lifted their voices high in singing the inspiring songs of Zion in honor and praise to our Heavenly Father, an humble servant to wit Eld. Danny Adams was preparing to come forward and introduced the services. Very humble in spirit he began to lead us about Zion, considering her palaces. Begging all to love one another, and let another generation tell of his goodness to another generation. That all the world may know of his salvation. In the meekness of the spirit Bro. Adams led us in prayer.

Eld. Paris Tackitt, approaching the stand with much fear to deliver the introductory sermon. Soon was blessed to preach from the 2nd chapter of Isaiah, 5th verse. Friday, August 4, 1989

1. The Moderator called for the letter from the churches that compose the Northern New Salem Association to be handed into the Clerk, on motion by Eld. Buford Brock, second by Eld. Forest Osborne. The letter from the Little Ida Church was read by the Clerk. A motion was made by Eld. James Branham, second by Eld. Bart Potter to receive the letters and seat the delegates. By the same motion, all queries and requests were referred to the committee on arrangements.
2. The Northern New Salem Association of Old Regular Baptist faith organized by electing the following officers to serve the next 12 months. The following Elders were appointed to take the vote: Elder Edwin Hay, Bro. Paul Morrison and Bro. Elzie Reed.

Clerk Eld. Hillard Newsome
Assistant Clerk Eld. C. W. Turner
 - (a) Noted by the Association concerning our finance committee and was moved and seconded that our finance committee be appointed at the same time of the election of officers. The committee appointed consisted of Elders Ray Hamilton, Ralph Caudill and Hiram Adkins.
3. On motion of Eld. Ray Hamilton, second by Eld. Hendricks Hampton the Moderator was authorized to make all temporary appointments.
4. On motion by Eld. Ray Hamilton, second by Eld. Larry Newsome, reading of the Constitution and Articles of Faith were omitted by the same motion the Clerk was asked to read the Rules of Decorum.
5. Called for legally organized churches of our same faith and order desiring to join our union and none responded.
6. Called for Associations of our same faith and order desiring to continue a Godly correspondence and the following responded by letter and delegate.
 - (a) **New Salem** - Represented by the following delegates: Pete Hensley, Woody Pack, Jimmy Waddles, Don Adkins, Hiram Adkins, Hurshel Hamilton, Roger Hicks, Talmage Hicks, Bill Hicks, C. B. Smith and Calvin Burke. Letter in the hands of Eld. Woody Pack. A motion was made by Eld. Forest Osborne, second by Bro. Henry Hobson to receive their letter and seat the delegates with us in council. They were given the righthand of fellowship.
 - (b) **Union** - Represented by the following delegates: Arvid Blevins, Earl Hill, Bill Thompson, Carl Ousley, Edward Estep, Charles Tackitt,

Palmar Hamilton, Rollin Hollins, Sollie Miller, Jr., Clyde Blankenship, Frank O'Quinn, Bill Ison, Bill Dunbar, Hagger Tuttle, Jessie Vires, Jean Johnson and Marvin Hall. Letter in the hands of Eld. Frank O'Quinn. A motion was made by Eld. Ralph Caudill, second by Eld. Bart Potter to receive their letter and seat the delegates with us in council. They were given the righthand of fellowship.

Lowell Adkins. A motion was made by Eld. Johnnie Newsome, second by Eld. Forest Osborne to receive their letter and seat the delegates with us in council. They were given the righthand of fellowship.
 - (d) **Sardis** - Represented by the following delegates: Edwin Hay, Maynard Hay, Hobart Hamilton, Jackson Holbrooks, Gary Holbrooks, Emmerson Jarrell. Letter in the hands of Eld. Edwin Hay. A motion was made by Eld. Donal Gibson, second by Eld. Robert Wallen to receive their letter and seat the delegates with us in council. They were given the righthand of fellowship.
 - (e) **Old Friendship** - Represented by the following delegates: Lacy Justice, Eddie Cooper, Elzie Reed and Leonard Coleman. A motion was made by Eld. Buford Brock, second by Eld. Ray Hamilton to receive their letter and seat the delegates with us in council. They were given the righthand of fellowship.
7. The Moderator appointed a committee consisting of the delegates from the Little Ida Church, together with one delegate from each of the other churches to arrange the ministry for Friday evening and Saturday morning who reported as follows: Friday evening — Elders: (1) Hobart Hamilton - Sardis, (2) Earl Lawson - . Saturday morning — Elders: (1) Lacy Justice - Old Friendship, (2) Frank O'Quinn - Union; (3) Edwin Hay - Sardis, (4) Hershell Hamilton - (5) Hiram Adkins both of New Salem.
 8. Called for transient ministers and members of our same faith and order and the following responded: Doug McCarty, Mike Slone, Ellis Banks, Hargis Tuttle, Stoney Blackburn, David Slone, Glenn Maddix, John Paul Hamilton, Earl Hill, Kelby Deel, Lonnie Mounts, Sam Franks, Bill Dunbar, Franklin Holt, C. W. Turner, Hillard Newsome, Danny Hamilton, Hayes Chaffins, Eddie Slone, Claude Dixon and Morris Wicker.
 9. A motion was made by Eld. Robert Wallen second by Eld. Hendricks Hampton that we the Northern New Salem Association correspond by letter and delegate with the following associations and the Clerk prepare the letters to said associations: (a) New Salem, (b) Union, (c) Philadelphia, (d) Sardis and (e) Old Friendship.

10. Appointed a committee to arrange the agenda for Saturday consisting of one delegate from each church together with the officers of the Northern New Salem Association and the officers and delegates from our corresponding associations: Committee to meet back at the house at 2 p.m. Friday evening.
 - (a) On motion by Eld. Larry Newsome, second by Eld. Ray Hamilton, the Association adjourned until 9 a.m. Saturday morning, August 5, 1989.
 - (b) Committee met pursuant to adjournment Friday noon and completed its work on the Bill of Arrangements. The services for Friday evening were opened by (1) Eld. Hobart Hamilton, and (2) Eld. Earl Lawson.

Saturday, August 5, 1989

The delegates met pursuant to adjournment Friday evening at the house to continue the work of the Association. As a lite mist was falling outside, inside the Little Ida Church, voices were lifted high. Singing the inspring songs of Zion, giving God praise, glory and honor for all his goodness. In a very meek and humble spirit Eld. Woody Pack - New Salem, introduced the services, led in prayer, that surely our Heavenly Father was pleased with.

1. Called the roll of delegates and marked the absentees.
2. The Bill of Arrangements was read by the Clerk. Eld. Johnnie Bently made a motion, second by Eld. Part Potter to receive the Bill of Arrangements and discharge the committee.
3. The Circular Letter written by Elder Donel Gibson for our 1989 Session was read by him. A motion was made by Eld. Robert Wallen, second by Eld. Buddy W. Carty to receive the letter and have it printed in our 1989 minutes. By the same motion, Eld. Danny Hamilton was chosen to write a Circular Letter, subject to approval at our 1989 session.
4. The finance committee appointed Friday. Item 2a consisting of Elders: Ray Hamilton, Ralph Caudill and Hiram Adkins gave their report as follows:

A motion was made by Bro. Leonard Robinson, second by Eld. Jim Curry to accept the report of the finance committee and discharge them of their duties.

5. The Moderator called for the treasurer, Bro. Newsome to give his report. He reported as follows:

6. A motion was made by Eld. Buford Brock, second by Eld. Larry Newsome to accept the treasurer's report. By the same motion Eld. Hillard Newsome was appointed recording secretary. He is to have 4,500 copies of the current minutes printed and distributed among the churches according to their contributions. The secretary is to receive \$200.00 for his services. Printer's fee is to appear on the front cover.
7. Eld. Buddy W. Carty made a motion, second by Eld. Bart Potter that obituaries of deceased members and friends of the Northern New Salem Association be printed in the current minutes. They are to be typewritten and double spaced. A charge of \$12.00 for pictures was approved by the delegates.
8. The following ministers were chosen by the committee to preach Saturday evening and Sunday. Saturday evening: Elders: (1) Arvid Blevins - Union, (2) Russell Hicks, (3) Hillard Newsome - both of Northern New Salem. Sunday morning: Elders: (1) Estill Hamilton - Union, (2) Roger Hicks, (3) Woody Pack - both of New Salem and (4) Roy Caudill, - Northern New Salem.

9. Called on the Elders to report the Union meetings and Associations attended for the year 1988 and 1989. Eld. Buddy W. Carty made a motion, second by Eld. Bart Potter to receive the report of the Elders given and excuse them of their failures and admonish them to try harder in the future.
10. In compliance with item #9 of Friday's work, we correspond with the following associations.
 - (a) **New Salem** — When convened with the host churches. To be held at the Association Building, Minnie, Floyd County, Ky. Beginning on Friday before the fourth Saturday in September 1989 and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend: Roy Caudill, Paris Tackitt, Ballard Brown, Ray Hamilton, James Branham, Johnnie Newsome, David Slone, Sam Franks, C. W. Turner, Hillard Newsome, Rich Griffith, Ralph Caudill and Jerry Runyon. Letter in the hands of Eld. Hillard Newsome.
 - (b) **Union** — When convened with the host churches. To be held at the Fairgrounds, Wise, Wise County, Va. Beginning on Friday before the third Saturday in September 1989 and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend: Roy Caudill, Paris Tackitt, Johnnie Newsome, Bart Potter, Doug McCarty, Terry Hall, Matt Slone, Woodrow Thacker, David Slone, Ezra Thornsby, Johnnie Bentley, Earnest Thornsby and Rich Griffith. Letter in the hands of Eld. Paris Tackitt.
 - (c) **Philadelphia** — When convened with the Friendship Church at the Association Building, Worthington, Ky. Beginning on Friday before the 2nd Saturday in August 1989 and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend: Buford Brock, Roy Caudill, Kilby Deel, Johnnie Newsome, Sam Franks and Paris Tackitt. Letter in the hands of Eld. Roy Caudill.
 - (d) **Sardis** — When convened with the Southern Home Church, Sparr, Florida (near Ocala). Beginning on Friday before the 2nd Saturday in September 1989 and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend: Roy Caudill, Paris Tackitt, Johnnie Newsome, Forest Osborne and Bart Potter. Letter in the hands of Eld. Paris Tackitt.
 - (e) **Old Friendship** — When convened with the Mary Lou Church, Paynesville, W. Va. Beginning on Friday before the fourth Saturday in August 1989 and continuing the two following days. Delegates to attend: Buford Brock, Roy Caudill, Paris Tackitt, Johnnie Newsome, Sam Franks, Raymond Stapleton, and Joshua Hicks. Letter in the hands of Eld. Johnnie Newsome.
11. On motion by Bro. Webb Hopkins, second by Eld. James Curry the request of the Little Flock Church was granted. Requesting the printing of

how we obtained our Constitution, Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum or of the Rules and Orders of our Mother, the New Salem Association.

The following taken from the record of the Northern New Salem Association, when organized on the 19th day of October 1957.

"By unanimous voice this Association agreed to adopt the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum, and the Constitution of our mother the New Salem Association. Also all rules and orders governing her body."

12. Upon request by the delegates from the Little Angel church, it was agreed by them to take their request back concerning lettering back to the Indian Bottom Association.

A motion was made by Eld. Buddy W. Carty, second by Eld. Joshua Hicks to abide by the motion in our 1986 minutes, item 11 of Saturdays work for one more year concerning the Indian Bottom Association. As our mother the New Salem Association is labouring with the Indian Bottom Association.

13. The Pilgrims Home Church delegates agreed to take their request back concerning receiving double married into the Church. As they were satisfied with the advice given to the Little Flock Church in item 11 of the current minutes.
14. A motion was made by Eld. Buford Brock, second by Eld. James Curry to grant the request from the Little Flossie Church, requesting the changing of their Union and Communion meeting time.
15. Eld. Harold Senters made a motion, second by Eld. Ray Hamilton to grant the Antioch Church request. Requesting that we the Northern New Salem Association purchase a fireproof safety box to keep our permanent record books in.
16. On motion by Eld. Bart Potter, second by Eld. Hendricks Hampton the request from the Pleasant View Church was granted. Requesting the name of J. E. Tolliver be removed from the list of ordained ministers, for failing to comply with orders of the church.
17. Bro. Dan Thornsby made a motion, second by Eld. James Curry to grant the request of the Pleasant View Church, Litchfield, Ohio, the privilege of hosting the 1990 session of the Northern New Salem Association.
18. By a secret vote of the delegates present, Eld. Russell Hicks was chosen to preach the introductory sermon at our 1990 session and Eld. Johnnie Newsome is to be his alternate.
19. On motion by Eld. Buford Brock, second by Eld. Donal Gibson reading of the current minutes were omitted.

20. Eld. Ray Hamilton made a motion, second by Eld. Larry Newsome that the clerk prepare a note of Condolence to our Sister Associations and also to our beloved Association.

21. On motion by Eld. Johnnie Bentley, second by Bro. Dan Thornsby it was agreed that we the Northern New Salem Association adjourn until the time and place mentioned in item #17 of the current minutes.

Elder Roger Hicks - New Salem Association, was called on to make remarks. He was blessed to gather corn from the mountain top, draw water from the everlasting fountain. Which gave strength to God's people and satisfied their thirst for a drink of life's pure water. Eld. Hicks was blessed to offer a very warm and uplifting prayer.

Circular Letter 1989

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

NORTHERN NEW SALEM ASSOCIATION

WHEN ORGANIZED IN 1957

From a long series of experiences we, the **Old Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ**, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations which shall be by a unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent them at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any members, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviates from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

Isaiah 45:5, 1st Cor. 8:6, 1st John 5:7

ARTICLE 2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments of the 1611 Authorized King James version of the Bible are the written words of God, and the only rules of Faith and practice.

2nd Peter, 1:21, 2nd Tim. 3:16

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace. "For by grace are ye saved through Faith."

Acts 15:11, Titus 2:11

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore a Saviour is needed for redemption.

Gen. 3:6, Romans 5:12

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance, and believe in the gospel, and regeneration of the soul, sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none such shall fall away and be lost.

Prov. 8:4, Matt. 9:13, Mark 2:17, 2nd Tim. 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

2nd Tim. 1:9, Luke 18:13-14, Acts 13:39

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on earth, and the mode is, IMMERSION back foremost so as to cover all over.

Matt. 3:13-16, John 1:31-33, Romans 6-4, Eph. 4:5

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Saviour, and that by the use of unleavened bread and fruit of the vine and feet-washing should be kept up until His second coming, by His believers.

Matt. 26:26-29, Mar 14:22-25, Luke 22:20, John 13:7-8, 1st Tim. 5:9-10

ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and that the joys of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

John 5:28-29, 1st Cor. 15:51-53, Luke 24:46

ARTICLE 10. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel, except such as are regular baptised, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the gospel, and has come under the hands of a regular chosen presbytery of the church and ordained thereby.

Acts 13:2-3, Romans 1:6, Titus 1:5-9

ARTICLE 11. We believe it is the duty of all church members to contribute money for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor, according to their several abilities.

Acts 11:29, Romans 15:26, 1st Cor. 16:1-2

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage, or indulge people in their sins, or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation, is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

Matt. 16:12, Acts 8:16-21, Romans 16:17-18, Eph. 4:14-15, Gal. 1:8-10

ARTICLE 13. We believe that the church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ, who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and with one another, and have given themselves to the Lord, and have agreed to keep us a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the gospel.

Acts 2:42, 1st John 1:3

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the church, and the government thereof is upon His shoulders.

Isaiah 9:6-7, Ch. 22:21-22, Luke 1:33

ARTICLE 15. None of the articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation, so as to make God partial directly, or indirectly, or to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice, and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips of imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother."

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any members from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Moderator requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled. And he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.

He did not die a natural death that day but his soul died dead to the love of sin and he was made alive in Jesus. When he came from that lonesome grove of trees he was like the lame man when Jesus healed him and he came leaping and praising God. I heard him say so many times, "when I came to myself I was saying things I never said before." God had made the transformation and raised him from a dead state to a lively hope in Christ Jesus that kept him all these years and led him across Jordon on Tuesday evening. Soon after joining the church he moved his membership to what is now the Little Zion Church in McGuffey, Ohio. He felt his calling to the ministry in 1956 and began to preach the gospel. He was faithful to his calling, never seeming to let tiredness of his body or the cares of the world effect his zeal in going and doing his duty. He moved his membership to the Little Flossie Church in the early sixties, and here he remained a faithful and dedicated member until God called him home.

Brother Virgil was a wonderful husband and father to his wife and children. His great concern, as we traveled along was for the welfare of the souls of his children and sinner people everywhere. Although he loved with an intense and undying love he was never willing to compromise his unfaltering convictions to please anyone. Dani told me that many times she would think he was rough on her in his teaching her but that when she would start home she would realize that daddy was right. When the kids got sick they know that daddy's God was the only one that never failed and was always there.

Many years, as we traveled I could see his body was failing but the spirit, that inward principal, got stronger as he got nearer home. I know his children, wife, and friends have a severe loss and sense of emptiness to cope with, and the church will have an empty seat on the end where he sat that can never be filled, but when the great trumpet sounds in the morning, God, who raised up Jesus from the tomb, will call to the grave and he will come forth to the invitation "Awake ye nations that dwell in the dust and come forth to everlasting joy and bliss."

So children, and friends today if you expect to meet him again, fall out with sin and follow the path he left. He piled up stones for a marker as he passed swiftly through. It won't be hard to tell where his path was. Long after his body molds back to the dust those stones will be evident. He

preached his own funeral as he passed swiftly through this land. So farewell, a little while, my brother. I'll see you soon again where we'll sing aloud together around the throne of our God and your lungs will be clear again. I love you so very much.

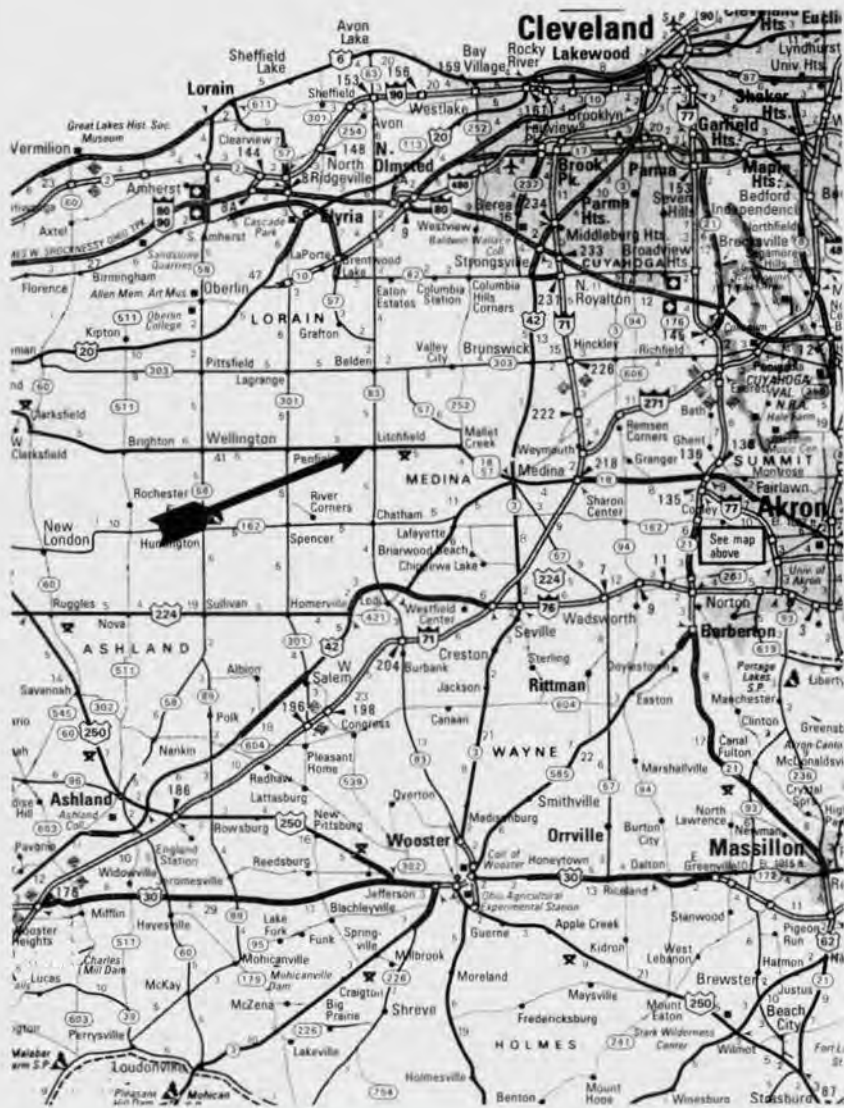
