Friday Session

As a cool breeze in early morning was gently flowing among the trees that stand tall near the Little Angel Church, Pilgrims from far and near were assembling together for this the 42nd Annual Session. As they began to lift their voices high in singing the glorious Songs of Zion, one soon forgot the tedious journeys they had made to be here.

Alternate, Eld. Jessie Pack, introduced the services. His subject was, "Bring a good report." A very humble and uplifting prayer was offered by our elder brother, Eld. Hobart Justice.

Being chosen last year to preach the Introductory Sermon was Eld. Morris Wicker, who was blessed to preach from the sixth chapter of Hebrews.

After delivery of the Introductory Sermon the delegates were asked to assemble at the house to conduct the business of their 42nd Annual Session. Those who were not delegates remained at the pavilion where preaching services would be conducted by Elders: 1. Murl Caudill—Old Indian Bottom, 2. Chuckie Hall—New Salem, 3. Jerry Thompson—Sardis, 4. Gary Blevins—Philadelphia, 5. George G. Baker—Old Friendship, 6. Terry Bryant—Union.

Assembling in the house, after singing one of Zions songs, Eld. Hiram Adkins of the New Salem Association introduced the service. A very humble and heartfelt prayer was offered by Eld. Jimmy Dale Sanders, Assistant Moderator of the Union Association.

Eld. Roy Caudill Moderator, announced that the 42nd Annual Session of the Northern New Salem Association was now in working order.

Friday, August 6, 1999

1. The Moderator called for the letters from the churches that compose the Northern New Salem Association to be handed in to the Clerk. On the motion by Eld. Buford Brock, second by Eld. Arvid Blevins, the letter from the Little Angel Church was read by the Clerk. A motion was made by Eld. Larry Newsome, second by Bro. Mike Hiatt to receive the letters and seat the delegates. By the same motion, all queries and requests were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
2. The Northern New Salem Association of Old Regular Baptist faith organized by electing the following officers to serve the next year. The following Elders were appointed to take the vote: Elders: Ellis Holbrooks, Jimmy Dale Sanders, and Murl Caudill. Officers elected:

(a) Noted by the Association concerning our finance committee and was moved and second that our finance committee be appointed at the same time of the election of officers. The committee appointed Elders: Hiram Adkins, Ralph Caudill and Ray Hamilton. Eld. Arvid Blevins made a motion, second by Bro. Pat Patterson to receive the report of the committees appointed and discharged them of their duties.

3. By a motion made by Bro. James Hall, second by Eld. Hargis Tuttle, the Moderator was authorized to make all temporary appointments.
4. On motion by Eld. Arvid Blevins, second by Eld. Buford Brock, reading of the Constitution, Articles of Faith were omitted, the Rules of Decorum were read by the Clerk.
5. Called for legally organized churches of our same faith and order desiring to join our union and none responded.
6. Called for Associations of our same faith and order desiring to continue a Godly correspondence and the following responded by letter and delegate.

The Moderator appointed a committee consisting of the delegates from the Little Angel Church, together with one delegate from each of the other churches to arrange the ministry for Friday evening and Saturday morning who reported as follows: Friday evening — Elders: Gary Adair - Sardis; Gene Johnson, Union; Teddy Robinson - New Salem. Saturday AM Elders: Murl Caudill - Old Indian Bottom; Willis Tolliver - Philadelphia; Richard Staton - Sardis; Jimmy Dale Sanders - Union; and James Tackett - New Salem.
8. Called for transient ministers and members of our same faith and order and the following responded: Kilby Deel, Herman Belcher, Ralph Caudill, Amos Williams, Buddy Carty, Donald Marham, Steven Miller, Dan Thornberry.
9. A motion was made by Eld. Robert Wallen, second by Eld. Doug McCarty that we the Northern New Salem Association correspond by letter and delegate with the following Associations and the Clerk prepare the letters to our Sister Associations: (a) New Salem; (b) Union; (c) Philadelphia; (d) Sardis; (e) Old Friendship and (f) Old Indian Bottom.
10. Appointed a committee to arrange the agenda for Saturday consisting of one delegate from each church together with the officers of the Northern New Salem Association, and the officers and delegates from our corresponding Associations. Committee to meet back at the house at 2:00 p.m. Friday evening.
 - (a) Eld. Hargis Tuttle made a motion, second by Eld. Hobart Justice that we the Northern New Salem Association adjourn until 9 a.m. Saturday morning, August 7, 1999.
 - (b) The committee met pursuant to adjournment Friday noon and completed its work on the Bill of Arrangements. The services for the evening were introduced by Eld. Gary Adair - Sardis, prayer by same, Eld. Gene Johnson - Union, Eld. Teddy Robinson - New Salem.

Saturday, August 6, 1999

Met pursuant to adjournment this the second day of this blessed old Association. As the sky wore an overcast of fluffy, white clouds, drifting far away in the endless space. How sweet was the echo of the inspiring Songs of Zion, sung by the meek and lowly, the children of God. Eld. Tommy Dials, Moderator of the Sardis Association introduced the service and led in prayer.

1. Called the roll of delegates and marked the absentees.
2. The Bill of Arrangements was read by the Clerk. A motion was made by Eld. Ray Hamilton, second by Eld. Buford Brock to receive the Bill of Arrangements and discharge the committee.
3. The Circular Letter written by Eld. Danny Carty for our 1999 Session was read by him. A motion was made by Eld. Johnie Bentley, second by Eld. Buford Brock to receive the letter and have it printed in our 1999 Minutes.
4. The finance committee appointed Friday. Item 2a, consisting of Elders: Hiram Adkins, Ralph Caudill and Ray Hamilton reported as follows:

7. Eld. John Elkins made a motion, second by Eld. Hobart Justice to have obituaries of deceased members and friends of the Northern New Salem Association printed in the current minutes. They are to be typewritten and double spaced. A charge of \$15.00 for pictures is to be submitted along with obituaries to be printed. *(Please send me the obituaries as soon as possible throughout the year. Clerk)*
8. The following ministers were chosen to preach Saturday evening and Sunday morning. Saturday evening: Elders: (1) Wayne Turner-Northern New Salem; (2) Chester Cochrun-Absent; (3) Squire Hamilton-Absent; (4) Ralph Slone, Jr.-New Salem. (5) Danny Carty-Northern New Salem. Sunday morning Elders: (1) Hillard Newsome-Northern New Salem; (2) Woody Pack-New Salem; (3) Gary Compton-New Salem (absent); (4) Buddy Carty; (5) Paris Tackitt and (6) Roy Caudill-all of Northern New Salem.
9. On motion by Eld. Robert Wallen, second by Eld. Doug McCarty, the report of the Elders attending Union Meetings and Associations for the year 1998 and 1999 were omitted, although they were asked to report Associations attended.

Forest Osborn to accept the work of the committee, discharge them of their duties, and the Clerk, Bro. Newsome has the authority to upgrade or make any additions to the forms.
12. The report of the Committee appointed at our 1998 Session, item No. 20 of Saturday's work was given. In reference to the legality of the deeds of the Mt Zion and the New Mt. Zion Churches. A motion was made by Eld. Ray Hamilton, second by Bro. Jackie Hunter to accept the report of the Committee and discharge them of their duties.

Eld. Scott Hamilton made a motion, second by Eld. Arvid Blevins. If any members of the above mentioned churches ever comes back to the Northern New Salem Association, they are to come by the Association. Any preacher must come back as a lay member by being rebaptized.

13. Eld. Stoney Blackburn made a motion, second Eld. Rick Akers to grant the request from the Rose of Sharon Church asking to host the 2000 Session of the Northern New Salem Association. To be held on Friday before the first Saturday in August 2000.
14. By a vote of delegates, Eld. Danny Hamilton was chosen to preach the Introductory Sermon. Eld. Hargis Tuttle is to be his alternate and Eld. Lon Beverly is to write the Circular Letter for our 2000 Session.
15. Eld. Stoney Blackburn made a motion, second by Eld. Forest Osborn, to omit the reading of the current minutes.
16. Eld. Ray Hamilton made a motion, second by Bro. Marvin Potter, that we the Northern New Salem Association, adjourn until time and place mentioned in No. 13 of the current minutes, Saturday's work.

Eld. Arnold Whitaker of the Old Indian Bottom Association was called on to make remarks and led in prayer, bringing to a close this joyful 42nd setting of this blessed old Association.

Circular Letter by Elder Danny Carty

Dear Brother Delegates of the 42nd annual session of the Northern New Salem Association. Being chosen at last year's session to write this letter has been a great honor to me. It is hard to put into words how it feels to have had such a wonderful body show such confidence. I must admit that I feel this to be something other than an honor, for I deserve no honor, but I find this to be a great responsibility. So I will trust in the One I have now trusted in for near twenty years, the One that does deserve the honor, and I will strive to make Him glad.

I do not intend this to be lengthy but I do pray that from the first word to the last this letter be directed from the Father through His Son. I trust with all my heart that at least one sentence or perhaps one word will be felt and will draw both saint and sinner closer to Jesus, for I write it for no other cause than it be another witness of Christ.

Some might think it strange to suggest that a saint would need to be drawn closer to Jesus. But I find that when my troubles come, and the trials of life are greatest, is when I have let my thoughts stray from Him. I am reminded that though I feel I have experienced that new birth in Christ Jesus, I must be obedient and strive to live closer each day. So often the times I have failed to thank Him, or call on Him for a decision and I must cry out, forgive me Lord. I often ask Him to strengthen me, to lead me, to help me be a better servant. Don't thank for a minute young Christians that Satan is no longer on your trail. Satan is very real and he is there to buffet the heel of a Christian. He will do all he can to confuse you and occupy your time if you will let him. He will cause you every trouble that you will allow.

I too warm those that have been at the Savior's feet, had your robes washed white in the blood of the lamb, have experienced a new birth, but have failed to put your light on a candle stick, have failed to go home and tell the world what Jesus has done for you, that only Satan and his treachery, his lies and deceit is keeping you from doing so. The difference between a good work and a bad work? Is there not a good spirit and a bad spirit throughout this land? Is God anything other than good and very good? Is Satan anything other than bad?

Do you strive to walk after the things of the world? Are you ashamed to live and look as the bible and the words of Jesus have instructed? Do you fail to do those things, which Jesus has declared to be just? Are you stiff necked and proud minded? Are you quick to run to trouble and with the tongue eager to sow discord? If so this test has proved you to be a sinner. If you are of the same mind as when you became a sinner doing the works of Satan you are still in your sins. This is not my judgment, but your judgment, for by your own works are you known to be a doer of evil.

Let me now encourage you to test the other spirit. The one that is kind. The one that is mindful. The one that is loving and humble. The one that maketh not ashamed. The one that

enters the soul of one crying for mercy. It is not a proud spirit, it never boasts for boasting is excluded, but it is one that is free, one that is heartfelt, and one which will never die. Yes this spirit is eternal and is given as a gift from the One who opened not His mouth, a gift from the One who stood slain before the foundation of the world. A lamb led to the slaughter, led them for you, led there for me.

This spirit is peaceful, this spirit will feed you when you are hungry, it will keep you warm in times when others are cold. The best test of this spirit is its goodness and how it makes you feel about your brothers, your sisters, your neighbors, it will even cause you to pray for your enemies. There is a difference in how it makes you walk and talk. It is a spirit that will prove you are not the person that you once were. To experience this good spirit, you must repent and be born again.

I feel strongly today, I feel God have given me an authority to write, and a charge to warn lost souls to flee from His wrath. I thank God for the way I feel, and for the opportunity to address the church. A warning also comes to mind about that bad spirit. Too often I hear it encourage change in the old church. So I question, who among us is of authority to change the established practice, principles and teachings of this old time way? I quickly answer that no one is of that authority. Furthermore I warn those that would try, that it has been tried, and has failed each time. There is nothing new. God set forth a plan of salvation in the beginning and he has not deviated and will not deviate from that plan.

Do we want Jesus to change? I hear Him saying I come to do the will of my Father. Was the will of His Father to change things to suite the mind of man? Do we want our Rock in this worried land to be one that moves with every problem and temptation that comes our way? Or do we want it to be steadfast unmovable, a foundation we can encourage our children to build upon? What a wonderful promise that he left us by saying I will never leave you, I will never forsake you, I will be with you until the end.

When I decided to listen to that low still voice which was teaching me to do better, I chose to seek and build upon a foundation that has been tried, one that I believe changes not. I have seen many a forefather and mother established on this foundation. Many of them now sleep, but I will never forget their way and how they conducted themselves before me. I witnessed them living by that good spirit I have been trying to write about. Are we to suddenly be afraid of inquiring of the old path and walking therein? I am not afraid to follow that straight and narrow path and my hope is that we encourage our children to do so. Does God's people really want change in the old church? I say no, because it would not be pleasing with our Father.

Many say change is inevitable and for worldly things I would agree. The mind of man is never satisfied. Some say the young just aren't interested anymore, they won't walk in the way of the church. I would have to answer by saying that many surely thought the same of the prodigal son as he asked for his earnings and left to experience the big world we live in. But what he experienced was the very thing our young people experience today. He became hungry, he became dissatisfied and don't forget where he began to look. He began to remember Father's house where there was plenty. What a good shape he got in when he began to say I'm no longer worthy to be called a son, I will return to my Father's house and seek a servants place.

There is no peace, there is no safety, there is no gain without the love of God shed abroad in the heart. Sin is but a temporal joy that is followed by shame, pain, and death. When a sinner becomes willing to following the voice of Jesus, he will also be willing to change his sinful ways. And when God pardons those sins he will want to go home to his friends. Sinner men and women must choose the good shepherd and cry mightily unto Him.

To a broken heart and contrite spirit will I look sayeth the Lord. He will hear their cries and after that new birth they will walk in His goodness.

Brethren I feel with all my heart we are nearing the end of the journey. Jesus spoke of our time and He made it very clear that these days and the things we experience will be the last days. The old church is His bride and we must strive to keep her adorned for her Husband. I often long for the day we will meet on that blessed cloud of glory, all God's children from every part of the earth gathering shouting glory and honor to His name. He is worthy of all glory He is worthy of all honor and we must strive to please Him, not man.

I must begin to bring this letter to a close. The first annual session of our little Association was in 1957 the year I was born. Look at how God has blessed us, prospered us in these past 42 years. And look how we have aged. I'm not ashamed of the things this association has stood for. I wasn't ashamed of the old church when I was in sin. I was ashamed of me. I have been around the Old Regular Baptist for as long as I can remember. I've been blessed to travel this country from one sea to the other and there is no other like it. We should be thankful for that. I thank God that the preaching and teachings I remember long ago are still here for my children. God help us to march on, to help up the blood stained banner of our King.

I have asked many questions in this letter. It seems fitting because I don't feel worthy of many answers. But I know one has all the answers and so I will close as I began hoping and praying these written words will draw you to Him and most of all hoping I have pleased Him. Poor sinner man, poor sinner woman, ask Jesus what He would have you to do. He is not short on His promises, He will lead you, and guide you to a way of life no one can explain to you. You must experience Him for yourself.

I thank with all my heart the brothers of last year's session who had confidence in voting for me to do this great work, and I pray that every brother that is asked to do so in the future feel as good as I do now. Not that I have written anything great, but that I have written as I feel God has instructed.

Reprinted Items from the 1964, 1970 and 1980 Minutes of the Northern New Salem Association

Year 1964-Item 15: By move and second the association agreed to answer the request from several churches touching upon the question of sisters cutting their hair, using make-up, etc. as follows: It is the duty of every moderator of every church to exercise strict disciplinary action toward the violation of established practices. To insist on strict compliance with what sayeth the scripture concerning a woman of righteousness. Make them that would creep in the assembly just to destroy the peace and salvation of the church.

Year 1970-Item 17: The request from the Little Ruth Church "Asking for advise on how should a minister who has been excluded from preaching with sects and orders contrary to Regular Baptist principals can be received back into the fellowship of a Regular Baptist Church". We as an advisory council say to all our churches that you may restore such one upon strict examination, BUT not to return to them their credentials until they have been reexamined by legal presbytery.

Year 1980-Item 12: By a motion and second, the request from the Little Rebecca Church was granted to correct Item #13 of our 1979 minutes to read as follows:

We, the Little Rebecca Church of Old Regular Baptist of Jesus Christ having met at our regular meeting time being found in full love and fellowship of all members present agreed unanimously to send the following request to the Northern New Salem Association when convened with the Little Ida Church on Friday before the first Saturday in August 1979. "We, the Little Rebecca Church request the Northern New Salem Association to adopt a resolution against members of our churches belonging to secret orders such as Masons, Odd Fellows or any other related worldly organization that is an

offense to our sister associations as well as our own brethren." This question has produced friction far too long in our union and we feel it is contrary to our fundamental Christian beliefs and our church principals as we are not to be a part of worldly kingdoms. And farther that we advise all of our churches having such members to rid themselves of any members that refuses to disassociate themselves from such organizations. (And not preach with any preacher that belongs to a secret organization.)

CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTHERN NEW SALEM ASSOCIATION WHEN ORGANIZED IN 1957

From a long series of experiences we, the Old Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations which shall be by a unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent them at any time in the Association; to appropriate money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any members, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviates from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

Isaiah 45:5, 1st Cor.8:6, 1st John 5:7

ARTICLE 2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments of the 1611 Authorized King James version of the Bible are the written words of God, and the only rules of Faith and practice.

2nd Peter 1:21, 2nd Tim. 3:16

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace. "For by grace are ye saved through Faith."

Acts 15:11, Titus 2:11

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore a Savior is needed for redemption.

Gen. 3:6, Romans 5:12

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance, and believe in the gospel, and regeneration of the soul, sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none such shall fall away and be lost.

Prov. 8:4, Matt. 9:13, Mark 2:17, 2nd Tim. 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

2nd Tim. 1:9, Like 1:13-14, Acts 13:39

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on Earth, and the mode is IMMERSION back foremost so as to cover all over.

Matt. 3:13-16, John 1:31-33, Romans 6-4, Eph. 4:5

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Savior, and that by the use of unleavened bread and fruit of the vine and feet-washing should be keep up until His second coming, by His believers.

Matt. 26:26-29, Mar 14:22-25, Like 22:20, John 13:7-8, 1st Tim. 5:9-10

ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and that the joys of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

John 5:28-29, 1st Cor. 15:51-53, Luke 24:46

ARTICLE 10. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel, except such as are regular baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the gospel, and has come under the hands of a regular chosen presbytery of the church and ordained thereby.

Acts 13:2-3, Romans 1:6, Titus 1:5-9

ARTICLE 11. We believe that it is the duty of all church members to contribute money for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor, according to their several abilities.

Acts 11:29, Romans 15:26, 1st Cor. 16:1-2

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage, or indulge people in their sins, or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation, is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

Matt 16:12, Acts 8:16-21, Romans 16:17-18, Eph. 4:14-15, Gal. 1:8-10

ARTICLE 13. We believe that the church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ, who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and with one another, and have given themselves to the Lord, and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the gospel.

Acts 2:42, 1st John 1:3

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the church, and the government thereof is upon his shoulders.

Isaiah 9:6-7, Ch. 22:21-22, Luke 1:33

ARTICLE 15. None of the articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation, so as to make God partial directly, indirectly, or to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice, and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips of imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother".

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any members from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Moderator requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled. And he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.

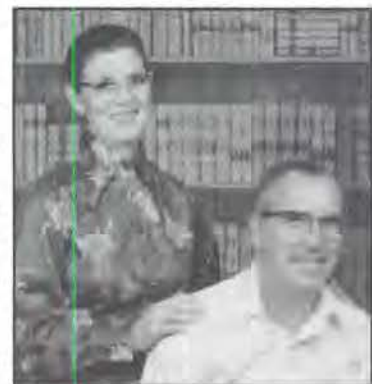
SISTER MILLIE HALL

He has been sadly missed. There isn't a day that goes by that I don't think of him. He will always be in our hearts and in our thoughts.



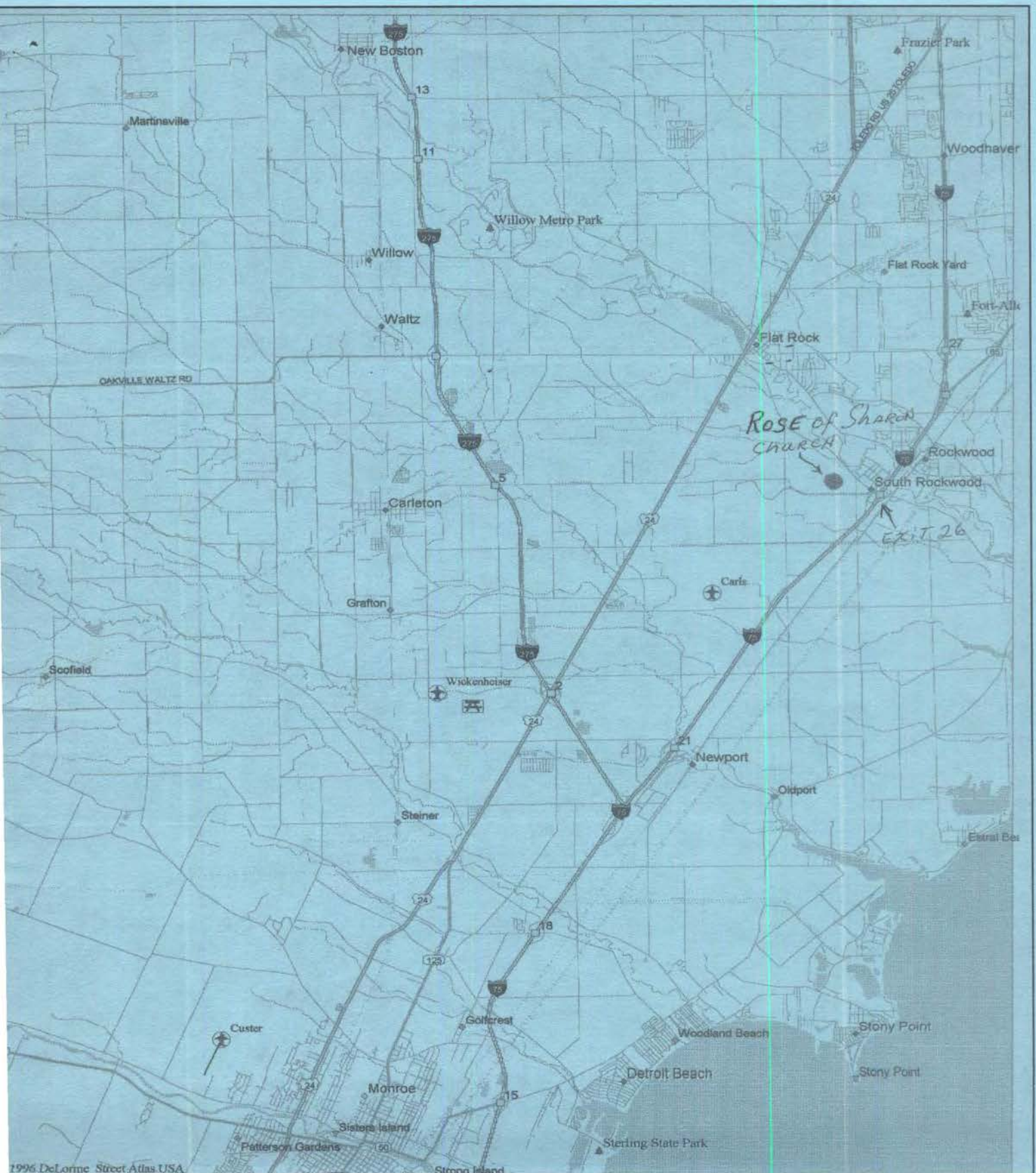
