Reprinted Items from the 1964, 1965, 1970, 1980 and 2003 Minutes of the Northern New Salem Association

Year 1964 – Item 15: By move and second the Association agreed to answer the request from several churches touching upon the question of sisters cutting their hair, using make-up, etc. As follows: It is the duty of every moderator of every church to exercise strict disciplinary action toward the violation of established practices. To insist on strict compliance with what sayeth the scripture concerning a woman of righteousness. Mark them that would creep in the assembly just to destroy the peace and salvation of the church.

Year 1965 – Item 16: That each church in our union shall hold its own key, and it is to be the sole judge of the members as long as it does not violate the Word of God, the order of the Association or Old Regular Baptist principles.

Year 1970 – Item 17: The request from the Little Ruth Church "Asking for advise on how should a minister who has been excluded from preaching with sects and orders contrary to Regular Baptist principles can be received back into the fellowship of a Regular Baptist Church." We as an advisory council say to all our churches that you may restore such one upon strict examination, BUT not to return to them their credentials until they have been reexamined by legal presbytery.

Year 1980 – Item 12: By a motion and second, the request from the Little Rebecca Church was granted to correct Item #13 of our 1979 minutes to read as follows:

We, the Little Rebecca Church of Old Regular Baptist of Jesus Christ having met at our regular meeting time being found in full love and fellowship of all members present agreed unanimously to send the following request to the Northern New Salem Association when convened with the Little Ida Church on Friday before the first Saturday in August 1979. "We, the Little Rebecca Church request the Northern New Salem Association to adopt a resolution against members of our churches belong to secret orders such as Masons, Odd Fellows or any other related worldly organization that is an offense to our Sister Association as well as our own brethren". This question has produced friction far too long in our union and we feel it is contrary to our fundamental Christian beliefs and our church principles as we are not to be a part of a worldy kingdom. And farther that we advise all of our churches having such members to rid themselves of any members that refuse to disassociate themselves from such organizations. (And not preach with any preacher that belongs to a secret organization.)

Year 2003 – Item 15: A motion was made by Eld. Larry Newsome, second by Eld. Harrison Runyon that we as an adviser and counselor answer the request of the Pleasant View, Eternal Rose and True Vine Churches concerning Item #17 of our 2002 Minutes. The following will replace Item #17: "We say to our churches to advise their ministers to refrain from taking any part in the services of churches not in correspondence with the Northern New Salem Association. This means preaching or baptizing members into their fellowship. If this is violated the minister will be silenced for a period of time, satisfactory to his home church. Under no circumstance will this be less than twelve (12) months for the first offense, and if this should happen a second time he would automatically be excluded.

Concerning funerals: If a family wants a minister of the Old Regular Baptist faith to participate in a funeral service where another church minister (not of our correspondence) is going to take part or be used in part of the services. This is acceptable as long as the Regular Baptist minister separates the services by song, prayer and dismission called. See Item #17 of our 1970 Minutes. This advice is to be printed in our Minutes until future action is taken.

PROCEEDINGS

Of The

Sixtieth Annual Session of the Northern New Salem Association of Old Regular Baptist The Church of Jesus Christ Dedicated to the Memory of Elder Faris Tuttle August 4 through August 6, 2017

Friday Session

As the pilgrims gathered in the sanctuary of the Little Rebecca Church, due to the morning rainfall that God was showering down on our small Association, you could feel that sweet spirit stirring all around us. One could hear the sound of an old time song, sung by the humble pilgrims that had traveled countless miles to attend this, the Sixtieth Annual Session of the Northern New Salem Association.

Alternate, Elder Mike Fortner meekly approached the stand and was soon endowed with that power from on high. He was blessed to raise that banner of Love that God will hang over his children, that light hath no part with darkness, that God gave man a help mate here on Earth, and that obedience to God is the key to peace here on earth.

Having been chosen by the delegates at our 2016 Session to preach the Introductory Sermon for this year, Elder Greg Sowards, humbly approached the stand and began to sing a beautiful song. He then preached of how we must follow after God and be willing to be led by the Spirit. The enemy has power that we cannot overcome on our own but through the Lord we can overcome, because greater is he that is in you, than he that is in the world. (1 John 4:4) He reminded us that we must warn sinners to flee from the wrath that is to come.

After the Introduction Sermon had ended, the non-delegates were dismissed to the pavilion for preaching. The delegates were advised to remain in the sanctuary of the Little Rebecca Church where the business of the Association would begin. The following Elders were chosen to preach at the place arranged: Elders: (1) Gary Adkins-Philadelphia; (2) James Branham-New Salem; (3) Theodore Slone-New Salem; (4) Danny Hurley-Old Friendship; (5) Jimmy Amos-Union.

After gathering in the house and one of Zion's songs was sung, Elder Omery Chuck Hall-New Salem was called on to make remarks and Elder Barry Lucas-Union led in prayer. Our beloved Moderator, Elder Buddy Carty, announced that the Sixtieth Annual Session of the Northern New Salem Association was now in working order.

Friday, August 4, 2017

- The Moderator called for the letters from the churches that compose the Northern New Salem Association to be handed in to the Clerk.
 The letter from the Little Rebecca Church was read by the Clerk. A motion was made by Elder Paul Dye, seconded by Elder Lowell Mullins to receive the letters, seat the delegates and refer all queries and requests to the Committee on Arrangements.
- 2. The Northern New Salem Association of Old Regular Baptist faith organized by electing the following officers to serve the next year. The following Elders were appointed to take the vote: Elder Hobart Hamilton-Sardis, Elder Willis Tolliver-Philadelphia, and Elder Barry Lucas-Union.

- (a) Noted by the Association concerning our Finance Committee. It was moved and seconded that our Finance Committee be appointed at the same time of the election of officers, the Moderator appointed: Elder Richard Staton-Sardis, Elder Deffort Thornsberry-New Salem, and Elder Omery Chuck Hall-New Salem. Elder Doug McCarty made a motion, seconded by Elder Paul Dye to receive the report of the committee appointed and discharge them of their duties.
- 3. By a motion made by Elder John Elkins, seconded by Elder Paul Dye, the Moderator was authorized to make all temporary appointments at the Association and throughout the year. At this time, Elder Buddy McCarty appointed Elder Scott Little as the Second Assistant to the Clerk.
- 4. By a motion made by Elder Larry Newsome, seconded by Elder Danny Carty, to read the Constitution, and forego the reading of the Rules of Decorum, and the Articles of Faith. The Constitution was read by the Assistant Clerk.
- 5. Called for legally organized churches of our same faith and order desiring to join our union and none responded.
- 6. Called for Associations of our same faith and order desiring to continue a Godly correspondence and the following responded by letter and delegate:
 - (a) New Salem Represented by the following delegates: John Tucker, Preston Lewis, Clyde Lewis, Chuck Hall, Deffort Thornsberry, Ted Burke, James Branham, Daniel Samons, Carlos Akers, Darrell Calhoun, Glenn Frazier, Leonard Hamilton, Jeff Reed and Theodore Slone. Letter in the hand of Elder Omery Chuck Hall. A motion was made by Elder Larry Newsome and seconded by Elder Danny Carty to receive the letter and seat the delegates with us in council by the right hand of fellowship.
 - (b) Union Represented by the following delegates: Barry Lucas, Estill Hamilton, Earl Dean Yates, Eddie Lane, Gary Sanders, Jimmy Amos, Teddy Bentley, Tony Bentley, Garfield Thacker, Bobby Johnson, Kenneth Elliott, Danny Adams, Jeff Owens, Dennis Elkins, and James Coleman. Letter in the hand of Elder Estill Hamilton. A motion was made by Elder Lowell Mullins and seconded by Elder Hargis Tuttle to receive the letter and seat the delegates with us in council by the right hand of fellowship.
 - (c) Philadelphia Represented by the following delegates: Paul D. Moore, Ira Adkins Jr., Gary Adkins, Robert Adkins, Scott Adkins, Ted Parker, Jimmy Stewart, Wayne Caudill, and Willis Tolliver. Letter in the hand of Elder Paul D. Moore. A motion was made by Elder Doug McCarty and seconded by Elder Andy Fields to receive the letter and seat the delegates with us in council by the right hand of fellowship.
 - (d) Sardis Represented by the following delegates: Hobart Hamilton, Thomas J. Dials, Stony Blackburn, Richard Staton, Marion Duncan, Ivan Neal Thornsberry, and Clayburn Varney. Letter in the hand of Elder Stony Blackburn. A motion was made by Elder Bill Smith and seconded by Brother Rudy Djordjevich to receive the letter and seat the delegates with us in council by the right hand of fellowship.
 - (e) **Old Friendship** Represented by the following delegates: Arthur D. Short, Edgar Baker Jr., Roger Baker, George Thomason, David Lester, Danny Hurley, James Stacy, Dewey Matney, Allen Hunt, Andrew Ford, and Danny C. Justus. Letter in the hand

of Elder George Thomason. A motion was made by Elder John Elkins and seconded by Brother Hansel Brown to receive the letter and seat the delegates with us in council by the right hand of fellowship.

- (f) **Old Indian Bottom** Represented by the following delegates: Aaron Whitaker Jr., Dannie Caudill, Wendall Lycans, Reuben Lycans, and Delmar Jones. Letter in the hand of Brother Wendall Lycans. A motion was made by Elder Doug McCarty and seconded by Brother James Wagner to receive the letter and seat the delegates with us in council by the right hand of fellowship.
- 7. The Moderator appointed a committee consisting of the delegates from the Little Rebecca Church, together with one delegate from each of the other churches, to arrange the ministers for Friday evening and Saturday morning, who reported as follows:

Friday evening — Elders: (1) Earl Dean Yates-Union; (2) Barry Lucas-Union.

Saturday morning — Elders: (1) Aaron Whitaker-Old Indian Bottom; (2) Deffort Thornsberry-New Salem; (3) Danny Justus-Old Friendship; (4) Willis Tolliver-Philadelphia; (5) Danny Adams-Union; (6) Richard Staton-Sardis.

- 8. Called for transient ministers and members of our same faith and order and the following responded: Elder Billy Miller.
- 9. A motion was made by Elder Doug McCarty, seconded by Elder Steven Miller that we, the Northern New Salem Association, correspond by letter and delegate with the following Associations: (a) New Salem; (b) Union (c) Philadelphia; (d) Sardis; (e) Old Friendship; and (f) Old Indian Bottom.
- 10. The Moderator appointed a committee to arrange the agenda for Saturday, consisting of one delegate from each church, together with the officers of the Northern New Salem Association, and the officers and delegates from our corresponding Associations. The committee on Arrangements is to meet back at the house at 2:00 p.m. Friday afternoon.
 - (a) Elder Danny Carty made a motion, seconded by Elder Scott Hamilton that we, the Northern New Salem Association, adjourn until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, August 5, 2017.
 - (b) The committee met pursuant to adjournment Friday afternoon and completed its work on the Bill of Arrangements. The services for the evening were introduced by Elder Earl Dean Yates, prayer held by the same and closed by Elder Barry Lucas.

Saturday, August 5, 2017

In accordance with having met pursuant to adjournment, this the second day of three of the Northern New Salem Association, the Association delegates and attenders reconvened at the Little Rebecca Church.

As the sanctuary of the Little Rebecca Church began to overflow, you could feel the flame of that fire that spreads in the dry stubble. Brothers and Sisters could be seen embracing in joy that they once again were able to gather together to worship the King of Kings in peace and love. Knowing that God had one more time blessed this Association to assemble in His name.

Services for the morning were introduced by Elder Thomas J. Dials of the Sardis Association. A song was called for and then Elder Thomas J. Dials offered a humble prayer.

- 1. Called the roll of delegates and marked the absentees.
- 2. The Bill of Arrangements was read by the Assistant Clerk. A motion was made by Elder John Elkins and seconded by Rudy Djordjevich to receive the Bill of Arrangements and discharge the committee.

- 3. The Circular Letter, written by Elder Joe Akers, for our 2017 Session was read. A motion was made by Elder Larry Newsome and seconded by Elder Scott Hamilton to receive the letter and have it printed in our 2017 Minutes. Objections were called for and none responded.
- 4. The Finance Committee appointed Friday, Item 2(a), consisting of Omery Chuck Hall, Deffort Thornsberry, and Richard Staton, reported as follows:

- 6. Elder Lowell Mullins made a motion and seconded by Brother Raymond Henderson to receive the Treasurer's Report.
- 7. Elder Doug McCarty made a motion and seconded by Elder Scott Hamilton that Elder Hillard Newsome be appointed recording secretary. He is to have 2,000 copies of the current minutes printed and distributed among the churches according to their contributions. The secretary is to receive \$200.00 for his services. Printer's fee is to appear on the front cover.
- 8. The brothers appointed to take the vote for who is to preach the **Introductory Sermon**: Elder Omery Chuck Hall-New Salem; Elder Earl Dean Yates-Union; Elder Estill Hamilton-Union; and who is to write the **Circular Letter**: Elder Thomas J. Dials-Sardis; Elder Clyde Lewis-New Salem; Elder Stony Blackburn-Sardis for 2018.

The following ministers were chosen to preach Saturday evening and Sunday morning:

Saturday evening: (1) Prayer held by Brother Glen Slone, (2) Elder Wayne Sartin, (3) Elder Hillard Newsome, (4) Elder Ray Hamilton.

- 12. Note the request from the Family of Love Church that we remove James Curry from the list of ordained elders. He has already turned in his credentials and taken his membership out of the Old Regular Baptist. Motion made by Elder Doug McCarty and seconded by Brother Raymond Henderson to grant their request. No objections were noted.
- 13. Note the request from the Little Rebecca Church to dedicate this Session to the memory of Elder Faris Tuttle. Motion made by Brother Chester Tuttle and seconded by Elder Raymond Vanderpool to grant their request. No objections were noted.
- 14. The request to host the 2018 Association from the Pleasant View Church was read. A motion was made by Elder Hargis Tuttle, seconded by Brother James Wagner to grant the request of the Pleasant View Church the honor of hosting and the Lily of the Valley Church, the Little Edna Church, the Eternal Rose Church, and the Mt. Olive Church to co-host the 2018 setting of this blessed Old Association.
- 15. Elder John Elkins made a motion, seconded by Elder Doug McCarty to forego the reading of the current minutes.
- 16. A motion was made by Brother Raymond Henderson, seconded by Brother Kenny Slone to adjourn to the place and time mentioned in Item 12 of Saturday's work in the current minutes.

The 60th Session was closed out by Elder Doug McCarty of the Northern New Salem Association and then Elder John Elkins of the Northern New Salem Association closed out the Association in a humble prayer.

Sabbath Morning, August 6, 2017

Having assembled ourselves for this third and final day of our blessed, Old Association, we gathered once again with a desire to be showered from on high with the sweet spirit of our Father. 2017 Circular Letter

To my Friends and Delegates of the Northern New Salem Association,

As I was sitting and meditating over this letter, I was reminded of the day my name was announced to write the 2017 Circular Letter of the Northern New Salem Association. Now I'm here today, standing in my Father's love, sharing with you the letter I have wrote.

As long as I've been around the church, I've enjoyed reading these letters. Often, I've wondered what it would be like to have this honor placed upon me. Then it did on August 6th, 2016, I received the responsibility to write the 60th Letter of Our Association. At first, I didn't think I heard it right. Then I clearly heard someone say, "Everybody knows Brother Joe Akers." However, I know everybody doesn't know Brother Joe Akers and with my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, I hope it stays that way. My life is hidden in Christ, I want to live out my walk with Christ in sincerity, being true to my Father in all my ways. When you look at me I hope you see the Son of God working through and in me. That I would be the brightest light for my Father that is possible by His grace bestowed upon me.

Resting in the words, spoke to encourage people, I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me. These precious words are often recited loosely and not taken to heart. When it is used this way, it diminishes it's intended purpose. It becomes flawed in its usage. As a child of the most high, I am made glad to learn of him, to use the mind of Christ to understand just why the Apostle Paul said it that way to the Philippians. He had been through the fiery trials, through the nights that seemed to never end, in his way he was thanking and encouraging them that he was hanging on to Christ above all. That he wasn't going to be there with them always but the same Christ he trusted in would be. As brothers and sisters in Christ we drift toward other believers, till one day the Lord calls that one home. Then what? That my friends, is what I think of. About when verses are used as statement or rally cries. Has any prayer been invoked? Has any thought been considered? My heart hurts, from what my ears hear from our conversations when I see people dismiss a brother or sister's opinion, act of kindness, or even their apology as if one isn't worthy of the grace and mercy that is offered to everyone who will seek after it. Who am I that I should dismiss or not acknowledge another person? Am I any better than them? I myself found myself lost and searching, it isn't hard for me to put myself in a place where I felt unlovable, unforgivable, and undeserving of the Father's love. I'm writing this with my new heart, a heart of flesh, a heart of compassion that I received in the moment Jesus washed away all my guilt and fear. As my heart trembled from the love that was being poured into it by the Father. Never to be hardened by this world again. Sure, the road is hard, rough and lonely at times, but that doesn't last forever. I want you to be encouraged, stay encouraged, and be encouraging. For I am going to a place where there is just an everlasting day, one eternal day. So yes, I do believe I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me. It's by the love of God shed on the cross applied to my soul that I'm able to say it, live it, and believe it. To look over each other's faults, that brothers and sisters will help me up and over my transgressions and not cut me off from their love. For they don't have the power to separate me from the love of Christ. Also, it is a lot better to dwell in unity and let love cover us then to be the unforgiving one. Unity doesn't just happen; all parties must want it and work toward keeping it. That is where brotherly love comes in, you want unity more than your way. And they shall put my name upon the children of Israel; and I will bless them.

CONSTITUTION OF THE NORTHERN NEW SALEM ASSOCIATION WHEN ORGANIZED IN 1957

From a long series of experiences we, the Old Regular Baptist Church of Jesus Christ, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their

producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations which shall be by a unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent them at any time in the Association; to appropriate money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any members, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union

which violates the rules of the Association or deviates from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to a seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

Isaiah 45:5, 1st Cor. 8:6, 1st John 5:7

ARTICLE 2. We believe the scriptures of the Old and New Testaments of the 1611 Authorized King James version of the Bible are the written words of God, and the only rules of Faith and practice.

2nd Peter 1:21, 2nd Tim. 3:16

ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace. *"For by grace are ye saved through Faith."*

Acts 15:11, Titus 2:11

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin, and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore a Savior is needed for redemption. Gen. 3:6, Romans 5:12

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance, and believe in the gospel, and regeneration of the soul, sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none such shall fall away and be lost.

Prov. 8:4, Matt. 9:13, Mark 2:17, 2nd Tim. 2:9, 1st Peter 1:23 **ARTICLE 6.** We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

2nd Tim. 1:9, Luke 18:13-14, Acts 13:39

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's church on Earth, and the mode is IMMERSION back foremost so as to cover all over.

Matt. 3:13-16, John 1:31-33, Romans 6-4, Eph. 4:5 **ARTICLE 8.** We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Savior, and that by the use of unleavened bread and fruit of the vine and feet-washing should be kept up until His second coming, by His believers.

Matt. 26:26-29, Mark 14:22-25, Luke 22:20, John 13:7-8, 1st Tim. 5:9-10 **ARTICLE 9.** We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and unjust, and that the joys of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

John 5:28-29, 1st Cor. 15:51-53, Luke 24:46 **ARTICLE 10.** We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances and commands of the gospel, except such as are regular baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the gospel, and has come under the hands of a regular chosen presbytery of the church and ordained thereby.

Acts 13:2-3, Romans 1:6, Titus 1:5-9

ARTICLE 11. We believe that it is the duty of all church members to contribute money for defraying all reasonable expenses of the church, never forgetting the poor, according to their several abilities.

Acts 11:29, Romans 15:26, 1st Cor. 16:1-2

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage, or indulge people in their sins, or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation, is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

Matt. 16:12, Acts 8:16-21, Romans 16:17-18, Eph. 4:14-15, Gal. 1:8-10 **ARTICLE 13.** We believe that the church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ, who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and with one another, and have given themselves to the Lord, and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline, according to the rules of the gospel.

Acts 2:42, 1st John 1:3

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the church, and the government thereof is upon his shoulders.

Isaiah 9:6-7, Ch. 22:21-22, Luke 1:33

ARTICLE 15. We believe that a sanctioned marriage of God is between a man and a woman only. Also we believe in receiving members into our fellowship that follow the natural dating relationship that leads to holy matrimony between a man and a woman only; thereby, preserving the family unit of father, mother, and children.

Eph. 5:22, 23, 28, St. Mark 10:6-8, Romans 1:26, 27 **ARTICLE 16.** None of the articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation, so as to make God partial directly, indirectly, or to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these articles be altered without legal notice, and free consent.

John 3:16, Heb. 2:9

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a moderator, an assistant moderator, clerk, and assistant clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, who shall rise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips of imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother".

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any members from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the rules of decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Moderator requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member provided the chair be filled. And he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.

He graduated high school, worked in a drug store until he got a job with Delco Moraine, General Motors, from which he retired. Emory met and married his first wife, Bertha Mullins. To this union was born three sons: Paul, who died at birth, George, and Joseph. He adored his sons and considered them to be his greatest achievement in life. He tried to give them a good life and to teach

ANNA LOU THORNSBERRY

November 18, 1958 - May 20, 2017 (age 58)

When Anna was born in 1958, the doctor told Dad there was a home for kids like Anna. My dad said, "Don't you ever say anything like that again, as long as I'm alive, she has a home." When Anna developed Alzheimer's, people said to me, "There is a home for people like Anna" and I said, "As long as I'm alive, she has a home."

I always admired my parents for putting Anna out there in public, because in the 50's and 60's that just wasn't done.

Mom was in the hospital 10 days when Anna was born because she had a C section. She wasn't told there was anything wrong with Anna until the doctor told her to give Anna some medicine upon discharge. Mom

asked what was wrong with her. The doctor said she had Mongolism, she Anna Lou would never talk, never walk, or even be able to sit up... she would be like a dishrag.

Children didn't go to the doctor back then unless they were sick. So years later when mom took us to the doctor, he was examining me, and asked who was that child running all over his office, getting into everything. Mom said, "That's my dishrag, Anna." See, Anna was never told she couldn't run!!

She ran a lot; she loved to be ornery when she was little. She liked to get people excited. She was nearly impossible to keep up with. One time, my Grandma Mattie was supposed to help me watch Anna as we sat in the car on a hot day with the windows down (that was before air conditioning). It took two people who didn't blink at the same time or she was gone. We blinked. She went out the window; but I saw just a blur of her going into a building in Plymouth. I was probably around seven. I ran up to the building and saw a tall stairway, but no Anna. I was pretty sure that's where she went. As I got to the top of the stairs, there was a door wide open, so I couldn't knock. I peaked inside and saw what I knew to be migrant workers watching TV with those old TV dinners on TV trays. I asked if they saw my sister, but they just looked at me as scared as I felt. They spoke to me in a foreign language and pointed excitedly to another room. Thank goodness they didn't have a back door because there she stood, looking trapped. She liked to run in stores, too. It was always my job to watch her. She liked to hide in the racks. So, I figured out to find her legs under the racks and then just keep yelling for her in the same vicinity so at least she would stay in one place.

She liked to let other things run too and thought it was great fun to let our giant hogs out. Not funny on a state highway and not easy to get back in the pen.

All that running would make her tired, so she would sit in the floor, right there, wherever she was, like a mule. People would have to walk around her. If she was on the run, she'd find a place to sit. You would usually find her in the TV section sitting in their best chair, relaxed and enjoying herself. Or, like the time I took her to a big home improvement store in Cleveland; where there was no furniture, I thought okay... what could she sit on? Oh no! Sure enough I found her sitting on a toilet. I said, "Anna!" She said, "I'm not using it!" She was never one to concern herself with appearances.

Because Anna was always running off, Mom would always say, "Someone is going to kidnap Anna." I would say, "Believe me, they will bring her back in a hurry and we can charge them to take her back."

Speaking of taking back, we often had to go back to stores to return things Anna had stolen. Mom and Dad would get us most anything we wanted. She just enjoyed being sneaky. She returned to this habit when she got Alzheimer's. She would steal doctor's office magazines. I would return them and they would say she could just keep them. I was always afraid she would steal something when we were shopping and they would think I was in on the heist. When she was little, she liked the sound of glass crashing. We tried to only have plastic in our house, but Pepsi only came in bottles back then. Mom would try to hide it, but Anna would always find it. Anna fell on the concrete where she crashed the glasses when she was five. She chipped her two front teeth. They took her to a dentist who, without asking, pulled Anna's front teeth because he expected she wouldn't cooperate to get them capped. They didn't get consent in the 1960's, so that's what set off Anna's dental problems as teeth shifted and she wouldn't wear partials.

She wouldn't wear glasses either, which is why her crossed eyes lead to blindness in one eye as the brain cancelled messages it received.

I was often called upon to be Anna's interpreter as I was the one who could almost always understand what she said.

Another big joy of Anna's life was catching someone asleep and whopping them over the head with something. Cledy can tell you about that. He can tell you about the cats we rescued. She was always putting them in the dryer. She tried to wash them first, but the controls were more complicated. She would rub her hands together and giggle with delight as the cat rolled to visibility in the window.

She liked to throw her shoes out the bus window. Many nights after school, we would have to drive the country roads, following her directions, as she would lead us to exactly where the shoes would be.

She set the house on fire once. She was afraid of the toaster so she used a paper towel to get the toast out and caught the whole roll on fire. I smelled smoke and Dad and I put it out. Anna was found locked in the truck in the attached garage looking terrified. She threw open the door and said, "Get in quick Charlene, the house is on fire!" I said, "No, it isn't." She said, "OH YES IT IS!" See, Mom always put us in a vehicle with rubber tires when there was a storm, drug us out of bed and into a vehicle and locked the doors (in case there was someone lurking in the night who wasn't afraid of lightening).

There were some advantages to having Anna as your sister. Parents would just assume Anna broke everything. So, since Anna didn't get in trouble anyway, I let her take the blame far a few of my transgressions. I figured, hey, she owes me!

I was never told Anna had any sort of condition. She was just Anna! When I was about six, a little girl came to the house with her dad to dig up our septic system. We had a lot of trouble with it because Anna was always flushing all sorts of things down the toilet. The little girl said her dad told her there was something wrong with Anna and asked me what it was. I said, "i don't know, I'll ask my mom." I was worried that she was sick. I ran down the stairs and asked Mom. That's when she told me. I was shocked; I just thought she didn't speak clearly and was stubborn! I ran up the stairs to tell the girl and she asked if there was something wrong with me, too. I said, "I don't know," and ran back downstairs to ask. I still don't think there was anything WRONG with Anna.

One of my favorite stories is about Santa. Our cousin, Lowell, got a snowmobile and a Santa suit. He wanted to give Anna her Christmas presents when she was about 16. I told him there was no way he could fool her. He had a very distinct voice and a southern drawl, not North Pole at all. People didn't get TVs for their own room back then but I begged because Anna sat right in front of the TV and cut the middle out of every show. Anna kept saying, "Oh, Santa, can you put it in my room and Santa, can you hook up my TV and Santa this and Santa that."

After Santa left, I went in her room to watch TV with her. She was chuckling so hard you could see it. I said, "What's so funny?" She said, "Lowell sure looked funny in that suit!" I said, "You knew?!" and she said, "Of course, Santa don't drive no snowmobile!"

I always said her birthday parties were bigger than Christmas. She would open up a card and if it didn't have money in it, she would cast it over her shoulder and say, "It's a dud." But if she liked the present, she'd scream with joy and say, "Somebody up there loves me!" You are all here today because you loved Anna. She loved you all right back and she would want you to know that now, you too can say, SOMEBODY UP THERE LOVES ME.


